
## Information about Turada™ Wallaba Shingles

The Wood (Eperua spp.): Heartwood is light to dark red to reddish-purplish-brown with characteristic dark gummy streaks. Texture rather coarse; grain typically straight; luster absent; taste not distinctive but with a rancid odor when fresh which disappears on drying.


**Turada**™ Wallaba Wood Shingles are usually sold in "Squares". One square consists of 5 bundles which will cover approximately 100 square feet, depending on the Pitch of the roof and the exposure used.

Length: 16" and 18" Width: 3" - 9" (average: 6")

Thickness: 7/16" tapered to 1/8" (+/-) 1/16"



Pitch: To determine the pitch of your roof, simply measure how many inches it rises for every foot it runs.



Exposure: Means how much of each shingle is exposed to the weather.

Typical exposure is 5"to 6"








## Installation:




Space shingles 1/8" apart. These joints allow for expansion and prevent possible "buckling". Do not put two joints in one line.

Allow a side-lap of at least 1-1/2" between





Only two
nails are
needed for
each shingle,
no matter
how wide it is.



Always use a board or a marking line as a straight-edge to line up rows of shingles. Nails must be put 3/4" from edge of shingle. Recommended nails are .090" x 1-3/4" stainless steel ring shank nails.
